Adult & Aging helps ensure the safety, independence and well-being of older adults, persons with disabilities, and military veterans and their families.

APS serves Sonoma County Residents who are:

Dependent Adults

Vulnerable Elders

Age 18–59 with physical or mental limitations that restrict ability to carry out normal activities or protect rights, and not living in a licensed facilities.



Elder age 60 years and older



For Mandated Reporters of APS

- Mandated reporters are required by law (WIC 15630) to report any suspicion of abuse involving dependent adults ages 18-64 and elder adults age 65+.
- While not required to do so, mandated reporters may report cases of abuse in 60-64 population for elders.

Who to Call 24/7:

Role of Adult Protective Services

- Is a state-mandated agency to receive and investigate reports of elder or dependent adult abuse and neglect.
- Connects elders or dependent adults with services.
- Provides crisis intervention assesses danger and develops service plan to reduce danger.
- Investigations usually conclude within 30 days
- Offer short term follow up services
- Investigations are mandatory; services are voluntary.



Principles of Adult Protection

Adults have the right to:

- Be **safe**.

- **Retain all their** civil and constitutional **rights** (unless restricted by court).

- Make decisions that do not conform with social norms (as long as these decisions do not harm others).

- Refuse or accept services.

- All adults are presumed to have **decision-making capacity**.



How Does Capacity Impact APS?

- Impaired decision-making (cognitive decline) is linked to increased risk for abuse and exploitation.
 - Almost 33% of older adults age 65+ have some level of cognitive impairment & about 1 out 10 have dementia
- Victim autonomy and self-determination are respected
- Interventions which enhance safety can be developed and thoughtfully and ethically implemented



What can APS Do ?

- Evaluate each report
- Assign a Social Worker to investigate
- Refer to a APS PHN (Public Health Nurse)
- Refer to Law Enforcement
- Conducts a risk assessment
- Develop a service plan
- Short term case management to stabilize the situation
- Provide information and referral

Types of Reportable Abuse

NEGLECT: SELF OR BY ANOTHER

FINANCIAL EXPLOITATION

PHYSICAL AND SEXUAL ABUSE INCLUDING ABDUCTION & ABANDONMENT

PSYCHOLOGICAL/MENTAL SUFFERING INCLUDING ISOLATION



Changes in Appearance, Demeanor and Lifestyle

- Diminishing quality of lifeutilities shut off.
- Signs of Inadequate clothing, food - running out of food and medicine
- changes in appearance, weight and health.
- Vulnerable adult has a companion who seems to be making all the decisions.

- Changes in ability to follow a conversation
- Asking repeated questions
- Memory Deficits
- Can't find words to express thoughts
- Maybe experiencing anxiety and depression as a result of financial abuse

Self - Neglect

Definition: When a vulnerable adult is failing to provide for their own health and safety.

Fact: Over half of APS reports involve selfneglect.



Symptoms of Self–Neglect:

- •Weight loss
- Strong odors
- Dehydration
- Soiled clothing/bedding

Neglect by Other

Definition: Failure to fulfill any part of a Care Custodian's obligations or duties to an elder



Failure to assist in personal hygiene

Failure to provide clothing and shelter

Failure to provide medical care

Failure to protect from health and safety hazards

Failure to prevent malnutrition/dehydration

Financial Abuse

The illegal or improper use of an elder or dependent adult's funds, property, or assets including:

- Theft: debit card and checks
- Identity theft
- Predatory lending
- Scams:
 - Home Improvement
 - Estate Planning
 - Sweepstake/Lottery Scams
 - Embezzlement or manipulation

Changes in Spending and Transaction Patterns

- Missing property
- Someone else managing finances and assets
- Changes to financial documents (deeds/trusts)
- Change in spending habits
- Unpaid bills, eviction notices, or discontinued utilities.

- Unusual account activity from prior inactive account.
- Flurry of bounced checks and overdraft fees.
- Increase in Credit Card charges and ATM withdrawals.

Physical Abuse

Includes: Assault, Sexual Abuse & Medical


Symptoms

- Injuries inconsistent with explanations
- Unexplained cuts, burns, bruises
- Unusually withdrawn or fearful demeanor



Signs

- Inappropriate use of medication
- Unreasonable physical constraint or chemical restraint
- Non-consensual sex of any kind
- Inflicting or threatening to inflict physical pain or injury
- Prolonged or continual deprivation of food or water




or physical restraint from meeting with visitors.

Psychological Abuse and Mental Suffering

Includes: Threats, Harassment, Intimidation

Signs and Symptoms

- Fear
- Agitation
- Confusion
- Depression, withdrawal, emotional distress



* Psychological abuse is often co-occurring and a sign of other types of abuse

Red Flags

Dependency on others Isolation Cognitive impairments

Did you know?

- 80% of abusers are in a trusting relationship with the vulnerable adult.
- Signs of abuse may be missed or mistaken for "usual aging.

Victim Vulnerability

Reluctant to admit abuse due to: shame, embarrassment, fear of losing independence or being moved.

May be too incapacitated to report.

Refers to a caregiver's "anger or temper"

May have accidental injuries and/or avoid seeking medical attention for injuries until days/weeks after.

Alleged abusers may be:

Individuals with a history of mental illness or substance abuse

Emotionally or financially dependent upon elder.

Have a poor employment history.

New friend or romantic interest.


Alleged Abuser's Behavior


Express excessive concerns about costs

Attempts to dominate vulnerable adult

Restrict others from seeing or talking to them alone.

Controlling behavior and verbally abusive





Who are Mandated Reporters?

Any Person who has assumed full or intermittent responsibility for care or custody of an elder or dependent adult.

*W&I Code 15630



Mandated Reporters are:

- Health Practitioners, Clergy and County Welfare Departments
- Employees of Law Enforcement Agencies, Fire Departments and Animal Control agencies
- Employees of Environmental Health and Building Code Enforcement
- Employees of Financial Institutions, Brokers and Investment Advisers (SB 496)
- Any protective, public, sectarian, mental health, private assistance, or advocacy agency, or person providing health services or social services to elders or dependent adults

What does the law require?

A Mandated Reporter **must make a report** whenever, in his/her professional capacity/scope of employment, the following occurs:

- A reporter observes or has knowledge of an incident that reasonably appears to be abuse.
- 2. A reporter is **told of an incident** by the victim.
- 3. A reporter **reasonably suspects** abuse.

Safeguards / Dangers of Not Reporting

 All reports made by mandated reporters are confidential

- Punishable by imprisonment and fined
- Up to 1 year in jail
- Up to \$5000.00 fine if results in great bodily harm or death
- An elder/dependent adult may continue to be abused or neglected

Step 1: Call ASAP

Step 2: Write
